Dear Counselor or Mentor:

The office of Federal Student Aid, U.S. Department of Education, would like to share some updates to assist you in working with students.

### **Publication Updates**

As we mentioned in our 2011 letter, we have transitioned the *Counselors and Mentors Handbook* to be an online-only publication. The 2013–14 edition will be available at [www.fsa4counselors.ed.gov](http://www.fsa4counselors.ed.gov) in late November 2012.

Later this autumn, we will publish a new document, *Financial Aid for Graduate and Professional Degree Students*. Written for current and potential graduate and professional degree students, it provides an overview of the federal student aid they may receive, basic eligibility requirements, how to apply, where to find nonfederal aid, and key items to consider before taking out a student loan.

### **FAFSA Enhancements**

As a reminder: *FAFSA on the Web* at [www.fafsa.gov](http://www.fafsa.gov) allows applicants to access their IRS tax information and have it automatically inserted into the FAFSA<sup>SM</sup>. The 2013–14 FAFSA will include a brief series of questions to determine whether an individual is eligible to use the IRS Data Retrieval Tool (IRS DRT). (Examples of someone who is ineligible would include someone who amended his or her tax return or filed separately from his or her spouse.) Only eligible applicants will be able to retrieve IRS data, saving time and confusion. The 2013–14 FAFSA will offer IRS DRT beginning February 3, 2013. Also for the 2013–14 cycle, *FAFSA on the Web* will encourage applicants to use electronic signatures, with the goal of expediting application processing and eliminating the need for users to take further action once they submit their FAFSA electronically.

The site combines content and interactive tools from several ED websites. As a mobile-optimized website, **StudentAid.gov** is fully accessible on tablets and smartphones.

On page 3 of this letter, we've provided a list of short URLs that will take your students directly to financial aid topics of interest online—mostly on **StudentAid.gov**.


